Introduction and Context

MUTC was given status of Town Council in May 2022 by virtue of the Monmouthshire Boundaries Order 2022. It incorporates two adjacent communities of Magor and Undy with a residential population of between 6000 and 7000 and the precept for 2025-2026 was £350,000.

The area for the community of Magor with Undy is approximately 15.33 square kilometers (5.92 sq mi), though its SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) portion within the larger Gwent Levels is much broader, covering extensive tidal flats and marshland.

MUTC MISSION STATEMENT "To conserve and improve Magor with Undy as an attractive and sustainable place in which to live, visit and do business".

MUTC objectives of biodiversity include consideration of all planning applications to ensure biodiversity issues are addressed.

Consideration of all public open spaces ie. Common-y-coed Plantation as a public space for people to visit and enjoy. The community orchard and organising planters throughout the villages

The Town Council aims to promote sustainability and biodiversity goals as part of its operation activity subject to the Well-being of Future Generations Act.
